


# Remembering Gary "Mace" Mason

# CUMMINS CENTER AND SENECA

# YEARS OF KAIROS Ask many of our alumni for a single high point of their time spent at O'Dowd, and chances are good that their answers will be one word: Kairos. Loosely translated from the Greek in Christian scripture as "God's time," Kairos refers to the three-to-four-day spiritual retreats that students attend in their junior year at many Catholic high schools nationwide. Although it's considered a Catholic programsimilar to Curcio for adults—Kairos welcomes students from any religious affiliation, or even no affiliation at all. It offers participants the chance to examine themselves, their relationships with others, and their connection to God in a safe, trust-building environment. This year, as O'Dowd's Kairos program turns 15 (with 43 retreats complete!), we reflect on the power this deeply rewarding retreat holds for our entire school community. 8 DRAGON MAGAZINE





Typically held in September, November, and March at the Franciscan San Damiano Retreat Center in Danville, each Kairos usually accommodates 55 students broken into ten small groups, each led by one student facilitator supported by one adult.

"The small group is a really important component of the retreat experience, because there's a lot of deep sharing in which people bond and feel very connected," says retreat coordinator Karen Yavorsky, who has directed or coordinated Kairos retreats—at O'Dowd and elsewhere—for 12 years. Behind the scenes, student leaders work with Yavorsky to run logistics such as scheduling, supplies, and announcements. And a "home team" back on campus supports the effort as well. It's a well-oiled process, largely overseen by the students themselves.

Within the small groups, participants are led through scripted prompts, questions, prayers, and spiritual reflections, each activity building on the next. But while the groups are directed through parallel experiences, the outcomes are varied—people's stories are different, after all. Not only students but adult leaders open up too, creating a unique space for students to explore and be vulnerable.

"Something magical happens in those small groups," Yavorsky says. "Students begin to recognize things about themselves. There are invitations for reconciliation, so they're starting to think about how they're in relationship with themselves, with others, and with God."

Gabe Tarantino '20 continues to feel the impact of his Kairos experience today as a student at the Naval Academy, where he's a Kairos leader himself. "It was an emotional milestone in my life because it gave me my 'why,'" he says. "Kairos created an opportunity for deep personal growth that truly made me ready to become the person I've always wanted to be."

# YEARS OF KAIROS

Father Jim Sullivan, O'Dowd's chaplain, has been participating in the school's Kairos retreats since 2015. "It's a special structure that allows students to open up, both to themselves and to others, in ways that most have not experienced before," he says. "There's real power in telling your story and, for many students, this may be the first opportunity they've had to experience that power."

O'Dowd's curriculum sets a high bar for academic performance and the school's wide array of co-curricular and extra-curricular opportunities challenge students to develop their talents both in and outside of the classroom, Sullivan says. Beyond this, campus ministry helps students to discover and develop their spiritual potential, and Kairos is a key element in that process. "All of our retreats encourage our students to go deeper in terms of their personal understanding and growth," he says. "And Kairos in particular offers the greatest opportunity for self-reflection."




Father Leo Edgerly, O'Dowd's Vice President of Catholic Mission who has served as pastor for Piedmont's Corpus Christi Church and taught at O'Dowd's largest partner school, Corpus Christi, for 23 years, attended his first Kairos in September as the adult leader of a small group. In that group were three students from his Corpus Christi parish. "These are kids who I baptized, who I gave first Communion to, so for them to intimately share who they are with me, you know, it took some adjustment," he says. "I had them call me Leo, not Father Leo, and eventually they were able to embrace it."

Edgerly is also the director of the Curcio movement for the Diocese of Oakland, so he's deeply familiar with the retreat process. In order for people to make a positive difference in the world, he says, they must feel good about themselves. Through Kairos, students who have a sense of God's existence receive the message that they're loved by God. For students with different beliefs, the message is that they're loved by their brothers and sisters, by their fellow students, and by the surrounding O'Dowd community.









"That sense of being loved, it's critical to a person being able to share their own love with others," Edgerly says. "I really believe this: You do not need to believe in God. You can live a good life without believing in God. But you must believe in love. Love is essential to life. And it is central to having a successful life." Love can't grow in isolation, he explains. Love grows in a communal environment where we open up, share, and push ourselves to be vulnerable. It requires people to go beyond themselves."



# KAIROS

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Although "what happens at Kairos stays at Kairos," Edgerly, Sullivan, and Yavorsky can generally say that they've all witnessed dramatic student transformations during the retreat. "I've seen quiet, reserved students really open up to their peers," Sullivan says. "I've seen natural leaders take a deep look at their gifts, and what they might offer others through them. I've seen students, who came to the retreat convinced that there is nothing beyond that which we can experience



via the senses, embrace the possibility that there is 'something more'something that can't be measured or quantified by math or science."

In fact, many students find the Kairos experience so powerful that they come back as student leaders themselves. helping younger classes to navigate the experience. Typically, students receive six to eight weeks of training before attending as leaders.

Connor Tamor '18 participated in Kairos as a junior attendee, returned

as a student leader, and came back again as an adult leader. "It was important for me to keep the tradition alive of being a mentor to students who are going through some of the same emotions and feelings that I once held," he says. "Kairos had a significant impact on my life, and I felt called to create the same experience for other students."

Yalda Rafie '12 is another Kairos alum who returned as a student leader, and then led similar retreats at Gonzaga University in Spokane, Washington.



# SENIOR RETREAT

"Senior Retreat was an important part of my O'Dowd experience. We were encouraged to be vulnerable, to share, and to connect with ourselves and each other on a personal and spiritual level. I remember being surprised with what some students were

willing to share, and that instead of judgment or snickering there were hugs and kind words. The experience strengthened my existing relationships and I connected with new people I wouldn't have otherwise. So many faculty and classmates fundamentally impacted who I am and what I stand for, even to this day. And decades later, both Kairos and Senior Retreat have positively and meaningfully impacted my two sons."





"It's always amazing to reflect on what you learn about yourself—and others—as both a retreatant and a leader," she says. "I'm a leader by nature so it was an obvious choice for me to want to pass on what I'd learned on my retreat to others. There was no better opportunity as a student that allowed you to be your best, most authentic self."

The Kairos effect lasts long after students return to campus, Yavorsky says. New friendships are formed, students are visibly more confident, and relationships are improved. "I had one mom who told me, 'Thank you so much for giving me my daughter back,'" she says.

Wherever students may be in discovering their spirituality, the experience of Kairos brings a deeper understanding of our interconnectedness, Sullivan says. "How life itself, though a mystery, is charged with meaning and with a great potential to deepen our capacities for love," he says. "All of that, I think, can only deepen a teen's spiritual growth."





**A SPRINGBOARD FOR STUDENT ENGAGEMENT** 

It's not just history. Or sociology or economics or political science. Rather, the broadly named "social studies" comprises all these subjects, uncovering the lessons of the past and identifying themes to understand our current world.

"Our goal is to make each historical period deeply engaging for students," say social studies teachers Matt Lane and Howard McCoy. Lane has been at O'Dowd for seven years and McCoy joined the staff three years ago, at the onset of COVID. While they teach separate classes, the two have found they enjoy collaborating professionally on their lesson plans. "We work in partnership to make our classes creative and empowering, developing unique themes and projects that support students to interact deeply with the subject matter." McCoy notes.

Lane and McCoy begin lesson planning by asking themselves what they want their students to take away from a particular historical period. Once they've agreed upon the "big idea," weeks of lunch meetings, phone calls, and texts ensue as they hammer out projects and logistics. Lane's strength is in

the creative concept, while McCoy excels at breaking down the step-bystep methodology. "Matt and I ask ourselves, out of this whole period, what do we want students to walk away with?" McCoy says.

As one example, during a fall semester class on U.S. history, the essential theme was "how free is America?" By exploring our nation's freedoms and limitations from the colonial period to the present day, students were able to examine our modern-day voting-rights issues with more depth and context.

When a project concludes, Lane and McCoy look closely at what worked, what needed refinement, what didn't turn out as planned. And they always ask for student feedback to strengthen the content going forward. "We want students to share their experiences and voices, so we can make adjustments for the next time," Lane says.

For a Marginalized Peoples Project, students research how a particular group has been politically, socially, economically, and culturally marginalized in the U.S. Here **Ava Pearson '22** created t-shirt designs to demonstrate what she learned about Susan B. Anthony and the equal pay for equal work movement.







#### Consider a few of the projects Lane and McCoy have presented in the last year:



#### Historical Theme Park

Design detailed theme parks featuring the Renaissance, Reformation, Age of Exploration, or Scientific Revolution.



## "Mix-Tape" Edu-tainment Challenge

Competing teams write, produce, and record songs and music videos based on events or people of the late 20th or early 21st century.



## Virtual U.S. History Museum

Learn the history of slavery and abolition by creating QR-coded classroom and campus exhibits.



## Voting Activism

Research past and present voting laws from three U.S. states, create graphics to organize/compare findings, write letters to senators based on how they voted.



# Manifest Destiny Podcast

Teams research, write, and produce a podcast episode on Manifest Destiny, the 19th-century idea that the U.S. should spread democracy and capitalism across the entire North American continent.

"Last semester in Mr. Lane's U.S. history class, a group of us made a music video about the Emancipation Proclamation," says Lily Black '24. "The assignment had many different tasks for students who enjoy writing, art, or performing, which I loved. It allowed me to show off my creativity while also learning to do in-depth historical research."

The advantages of such innovative, theme-based curricula are many: Students can be creative in the process, learning the subject at a deeper level. They're able to draw a stronger connection between past events and their own daily lives. And it teaches them other soft skills that they'll need in the future, such as collaboration, time management, and learning new technology. "In adult

life, you don't get multiple-choice tests once a month," Lane says. "You have to learn how to work with people, how to build timelines, or how to think outside the box, so we try to incorporate a lot of that into our assignments."

"I really enjoyed the Theme Park Project because it allowed us to utilize the creative side of our brains, to research and collaborate with each other," says Tristan Valdez '23. "I learned more about the implications of past events and that helped me think about how we can improve our communities, society, and world."


Both teachers describe themselves as hands-on, interactive learners, and their innovative approach arose in contrast to the traditional lecture/ notes/test format with which they

were raised. "One of our goals is to create a student-centered classroom where the kids have some autonomy in demonstrating what they've learned," Lane says. "Another is teaching through an anti-racist lens, looking at how the systems and practices of the past have led to the world we're in now, and how those systems might be dismantled or improved."

In terms of conventional instruction, McCoy says, "I've learned that less is more." As a result, he gives students room to create their own learning processes. "If someone were to come to my classroom, they'd see kids in the hallway, or spread out all over the room," he says. "I'm usually not at the front doing a PowerPoint presentation."

O'Dowd's student-focused culture supports this approach, fostering students' passions whether they're into athletics or performing arts or social justice—or some other pursuit that might merit a new extracurricular group. In turn, McCoy's and Lane's teaching methods support the school's charism by tapping into individual gifts that might not be revealed by traditional assessments.

"These young people are our future, they're going to be impacting and serving our world in the years ahead," Lane says. "A social studies class is the perfect environment for discovering the spark of that service." McCoy agrees. "This is what got me into education," he says. "I've been teaching for nearly 26 years, and I've never seen my kids show this kind of joy in the classroom."

Last November, over 300 current families, alumni, faculty and friends gathered in O'Dowd's new Knauss Gymnasium for the annual Transforming Lives Dinner.



"I am a proud third-generation Oaklander, and equally a proud graduate of O'Dowd," said keynote speaker John Valva '84, who has devoted the last 25 years of his career to the successful transition of college students to their professional lives. He now serves as Vice President of Alumni Engagement and Executive Director for the Oregon State University Alumni Association. "O'Dowd prepares students to become strong citizens. The leaders. The problem solvers. The cohesionbuilders. The poets, lawyers, doctors, engineers, professors and community builders of the future," Valva declared.

This year's event raised \$500,000 for tuition assistance, ensuring that nearly 30% of our students receive the financial bridge they need to unlock their unique potential, explore their strengths, and discover the power they have to make an impact in the world.

# A NATURAL LIVING LEGACY

"To live in hearts we leave behind is not to die," wrote the poet Thomas Campbell in 1825. That sentiment has been beautifully manifested since the sudden death of O'Dowd senior, **Anna Costa '90**, in 1989. Her father, Steve Costa, and stepmother, Kate Levinson, responded to their family's tragic loss through their generosity to O'Dowd, demonstrating how creative philanthropy can build a lasting legacy.

Anna was a passionate nature lover, and over the last three decades her family and friends have honored her memory in ways that have enriched O'Dowd and created reverberating benefits for our students. That commitment began with the establishment of the Anna Costa Endowed Scholarship Fund in 1989. With over 60 scholarships awarded to date, the Fund has supported two outstanding students each year, now with a focus on Eco Leaders.

"Receiving the Anna Costa Scholarship made me feel that I was on the right track, making a positive mark in the community," says **Peter Van Tassel '94**, now an Oakland school principal. "To be recognized by the Costas was an honor of which I remain very proud to this day."

The family's creative commitment to remembering Anna has inspired the broader community over the years. In 2000, one of Anna's favorite teachers, Tom Tyler, invited her family and friends to celebrate O'Dowd's upcoming Fifty Year Founders Day by establishing the Living Lab. Together they planted 50 trees, including a ring of redwoods which would define the



future Anna Costa Memorial Circle. In 2012, **Katelyn O'Keefe '14** worked with volunteer landscape architects and students to complete the Memorial Circle, which has become a peaceful sanctuary for community members to remember loved ones.

This past December, recognizing what would have been Anna's 50th birthday, another 50 trees were planted at O'Dowd, bringing the total number of trees in memory of Anna on our campus to 400. Recently, the Costas used part of their living trust to establish the Anna Costa Tree Endowment, providing permanent support to maintain the trees planted at O'Dowd. And the Costa family remains connected to O'Dowd through the next generation: Anna's niece, Cecilia, graduated in 2022 and her nephew, Sam, is in the Class of 2026.

"O'Dowd has helped our family to heal over these past 33 years," says Steve.
"The scholarship fund supporting so many students, and the hundreds of trees that have been planted, are a living legacy to both Anna and our family."

Thinking back on his O'Dowd education, Paul Nuti '89 names a long list of teachers who nurtured his interest in math and science. "Mr. Parks always pushed me to think about mathematical concepts from different perspectives, so I learned that there's more than one path to the correct answer," he says. Such creative thinking inspired Nuti to pursue his B.S. in civil engineering from Santa Clara University and to build a successful career as an environmental engineer.

"I entered college thinking I would build bridges or high-rises, but found geotechnical and environmental classes more interesting," he remembers. As a college senior, he scheduled informational interviews from several engineering firms to get a sense of the professional landscape. When one of those firms, Weiss Associates, followed up with a job offer, Nuti's career began before he'd even graduated. He went on to become licensed in the states of California and Washington and a LEED® accredited professional in green building strategies.

After six years at Weiss, Nuti spent the next 20 years working for other Bay Area engineering firms. Then in 2013, he and colleague Alborz Wozniak co-founded their own environmental engineering consulting firm, Veritas Environmental Consulting, Inc., where Nuti continues as CFO and principal engineer. The company consults nationally to a variety of private and

public clients, providing services to move contaminated properties through investigation, clean up, and closure so they no longer threaten human health or the environment. It's a great source of satisfaction, he says, to be a good steward for the environment. "That's our goal, to make sure that sites get cleaned up and back to being good community resources."

Nuti and his wife, Elizabeth, a pediatrician, met while they were students at Santa Clara University and have two daughters, Julia and Emma. Nuti's parents were strong advocates for Catholic education, and all five of their children attended O'Dowd. "The school positively impacted each of us, and we've all sent our own children to Catholic schools," Nuti says. "Having multiple generations attend O'Dowd strengthens our family's connection to the school and, as alumni, we want to continue our support for the amazing work of O'Dowd's faculty and staff."

That support is recognized with the endowed Norma and Caesar Nuti Memorial Scholarship Fund. When Nuti's mother passed away in 1992, his father created the scholarship; when he died in 2014, the family added his name.

Looking back on his own educational path, Nuti has a message for today's students, who are under so much more pressure to excel in school. "I was a good student at O'Dowd, but I didn't get straight A's," he says. "It's about effort and attitude, not about getting the A. With effort and attitude, you can be very successful in life."

# Remembered for Her Passion as a Math Educator

Beloved O'Dowd math teacher and mother to three O'Dowd alumni – **Megan Riley '01, Matt Riley '99** and **Erin Riley '95** – Kathleen Riley passed away November 30, 2022. Beginning her career at O'Dowd in the fall of 1994, and retiring in June of 2020, Kathy was a loving and passionate educator, inspiring both students and her colleagues. A mentor in the Math Department, Kathy is remembered as a woman of courage and integrity who gave fully and tirelessly to all of her students, and O'Dowd as a whole.


